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South Dakota Delegate Selection Plan For the 2020 Democratic National Convention

Section I Introduction & Description of Delegate Selection Process

A. Introduction

- 1. South Dakota has a total of 19 delegates and 2 alternates. (Call I & Appendix B)
- 2. The delegate selection process is governed by the Charter and Bylaws of the Democratic Party of the United States, the Delegate Selection Rules for the 2020 Democratic National Convention ("Rules"), the Call for the 2020 Democratic National Convention ("Call"), the Regulations of the Rules and Bylaws Committee for the 2020 Democratic National Convention ("Regs."), the rules of the Democratic Party of State, the State election code, and this Delegate Selection Plan. (Call II.A)
- 3. Following the State Party Committee's adoption of this Delegate Selection Plan, the State Party shall submit the Plan for review and approval by the DNC Rules and Bylaws Committee ("RBC"). The State Party Chair shall be empowered to make any technical revisions to this document as required by the RBC to correct any omissions and/or deficiencies as found by the RBC to ensure its full compliance with Party Rules. Such corrections shall be made by the State Party Chair and the Plan resubmitted to the RBC within 30 days of receipt of notice of the RBC's findings. (Reg. 2.5, Reg. 2.6 & Reg. 2.7)
- 4. Once this Plan has been found in Compliance by the RBC, any amendment to the Plan by the State Party must be submitted to and approved by the RBC before it becomes effective. (Reg. 2.9)

B. Description of Delegate Selection Process

- South Dakota will use a proportional representation system based on the results of the June 2, 2020 Democratic Primary for apportioning delegates to the 2020 Democratic National Convention.
- 2. The "first determining step" of South Dakota's delegate selection process will occur on June 2, 2020, the date of the Democratic Primary which allows voters registered as Democratic, Independent, or NPA (No Party Affiliation) to participate. In addition to the Democratic

Presidential candidates, there may be a Democratic Primary for US Senate, US House, one Public Utilities Commissioner, all 105 Legislative candidates (both State House and State Senate have two year terms); county commissioner races, and several other county positions.

- 3. Participation in State's delegate selection process is open to all voters who wish to participate as Democrats. (Rule 2.A and Rule 2.C.)
- 4. South Dakota will hold seven (7) Regional Caucuses throughout the state on March 14, 2020 to elect delegates <u>for each</u> Presidential candidate to represent that region at the statewide caucus to be held the following Saturday, March 21, 2020 in Pierre, SD (centrally located).
- 5. Each of the seven Regions is comprised of five legislative districts as indicated in the table below. A physical map of the Regions is provided in Attachment 3 of the Delegate Selection Plan.

- 6. Each of the seven Regional caucuses are balanced in Democratic Strength giving equal weight to the vote for the Democratic candidates in the 2016 presidential and the most recent South Dakota 2018 gubernatorial. Anyone registered as a Democratic voter by or on March 14 and registered to vote in one of the five legislative districts in that specific Region are eligible to participate. Each of the seven regional caucuses will have a responsible Democrat, familiar with voter registration and equipped with voter registration documents to update any participant's voter registration to reflect their Democratic registration preference. A notary will be available at each location to properly certify the voter registration document.
- 7. The following Saturday, on March 21, 2020, the Statewide Caucus in Pierre will determine the priority order by which each Presidential candidate's delegates are listed on the June 2, 2020 Primary Ballot.
- 8. South Dakota has registration by party. Republicans have a closed primary. The Democratic Party allows Independents or NPA (No Party Affiliation) to vote in the Democratic Primary.
- 9. To encourage participation by youth in the delegate selection process, any individual who

will have turned 18 by the date of the general election will be allowed to participate in the delegate selection process.

- 10. Transportation costs to either the seven Regional caucuses on March 14, 2020 or to the Statewide Caucus on March 21,2020 will be the responsibility of those attending. The South Dakota Democratic Party (SDDP) will encourage county parties to help to defray the costs of eligible Democrats to attend these caucuses as well as provide sponsorship from the SDDP for any potential delegates to defray costs. Under no circumstances will a potential delegate be denied exercising their right to attend these caucuses due to prohibitive costs.
- 11. Votes shall not be taken by secret ballot at any stage of the delegate selection process, including processes leading up to the selection of DNC Members or State Chairs or Vice Chairs, who serve as DNC members by virtue of their office.
- 12. No person shall participate or vote in the nominating process for the Democratic presidential candidate who also participates in the nominating process of any other party for the corresponding election.
- 13. No person shall vote in more than one regional caucus.
- 14. All participants must be physically present at the statewide Caucus in Pierre on March 21, 2020; however, they may participate in one of the Regional Caucus on March 14, 2020 remotely by phone or other electronic means.
- C. Voter and Election Security. The South Dakota Democratic Party has taken steps to seek enactment of legislation, rules, and policies at the state and local level to enhance voter and election security, to accomplish the following seven goals:]
 - 1. Maintain secure and accurate state voter registration rolls, so that every eligible American who registers to vote has their personal information protected and secure; (Rule 2.H.1)
 - The SDDP works with the SD Secretary of State and the DNC to maintain voter roles. Through VAN we require 2 factor authentication for those who have access to VAN and take additional steps with those who maintain VAN.
 - The SDDP consistently educates voters on the voter registration process in South
 Dakota through voter registration drives. This includes information on how to register
 and how their voter information is processed and handled by the SD Secretary of
 State.
 - 2. Implement transparent and accurate voter registration list maintenance procedures that comply with federal requirements and ensure that every eligible voter stays on the rolls; (Rule 2.H.2)
 - The SDDP works with the SD Secretary of State and local county auditor offices to make sure that voter registration forms are submitted in a timely fashion.
 - 3. Promote the acquisition, maintenance, and regular replacement of precinct based optical scan voting systems; (Rule 2.H.3)
 - The SDDP works with local county officials and the SD Secretary of State's office to

promote the usage and convenience of precinct based optical scan voting systems. This includes working with county commissioners to include and request funding for the usage of optical scan voting systems.

- 4. Ensure that any direct recording electronic systems in place have a voter verified paper record; (Rule 2.H.4)
 - During the 2019 Legislative session, Democrats worked with the Secretary of State to pass HB 1027 which will require all polling locations to have a paper lists with voters registration information.
- 5. Implement risk limiting post-election audits such as manual audits comparing paper records to electronic records; (*Rule 2.H.5*)
 - The SDDP encourages all candidates to call for a recount of the election results if their race falls within the margin of error to officially request a recount by the county auditor and Secretary of State. Once the recount is requested, the county auditor hand-counts official election ballots to determine accuracy and they also canvass voters in the legislative district to verify provisional ballots.
- 6. Ensure that all voting systems have recognized security measures; (Rule 2.H.6)
 - South Dakota uses paper ballots at polling locations that are then sealed by voters.
- 7. Use accessible and secure voting machines that make it possible for individuals with disabilities to vote securely and privately. (Rule 2.H.7)
 - South Dakota law enables all voters the ability to bring an aide to help vote and a private booth to vote in.
- D. Voter Protection- The South Dakota Democratic Party has taken steps to establish, with DNC assistance, year-round voter protection programs to support educational, administrative, legislative, and litigation-based efforts to protect and expand the vote and advance election fairness and security, including the six goals set forth below. (Rule 2.1 and 2.1.1)
 - 1. Expand access to voting, including by early voting, no excuse absentee, same-day voter registration, and voting by mail; (Rule 2.I.1.a)
 - South Dakota has one of the longest early vote windows in the country, 46 days. The first day of early voting begins 6 weeks before election day and ends the day before election day. A voter does not need an excuse to vote early or absentee. During the 2019 legislative session while Republicans worked to shorten the early vote window, Democrats were able to successfully argue to keep the early voting period at 46 days with the help of the Secretary of State, County Auditors, and various interest groups. Currently we are able to maintain a 4 week window for same-day registration and over the past couple of legislative sessions Democrats have advocated for automatic voter registration.
 - 2. Ensure that voting locations are accessible, fairly placed, and adequate in number, and have a sufficient number of voting machines; (Rule 2.1.1.b)
 - Following lawsuits from the 2014 election cycle, the SDDP has successfully worked with the Secretary of State to open up 10 additional early voting locations across rural

South Dakota. Through the use of HAVA funds and work with the state we have been able to achieve these goals.

- 3. Speed up the voting process and minimize long lines; (Rule 2.1.1.c)
 - The State Party actively encourages voters to cast their ballots early during the 46 day early voting period, or we encourage them to fill out and cast their vote using the no-excuse absentee voting period. Due to a continued effort, we are seeing higher early voting numbers that result in shorter wait times for voting on election day.
- 4. Eliminate onerous and discriminatory voter identification requirements; (Rule 2.1.1.d)
 - The State Party consistently works with local election officials to ensure each person is allowed to vote using any state-issued picture ID card. This includes: A South Dakota driver's license or non-driver ID card, a passport or other picture ID issued by the United States government, a tribal photo ID, or a current student photo ID issued by a South Dakota high school or postsecondary education institution.
- 5. Count and include in the final total ballots from voters who are eligible to vote but cast their ballots in the wrong precinct, for offices for which they are eligible to vote; and (Rule 2.I.1.e)
 - Currently South Dakota law does not allow this process to happen unless there is a recount and the ballot is a provisional ballot. The SDDP is currently working with county commissions around the state, namely on reservations to move away from precinct voting in favor of voting centers. Due to the transient population of Native Americans on reservations voters often don't live where they are registered. Additionally, reservations are rural and spacious-meaning their voting precinct closest to them may not be the one they vote at. By enacting voting centers voters will be able to cast votes at any polling location in their county.
- 6. Facilitate military and overseas voting; (Rule 2. I.1.f)
 - The SDDP actively encourages overseas and military citizens to register and vote using South Dakota's Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA) Electronic Voter Registration System and Absentee Ballot Application System. This system is in compliance with all federal and state voting laws and facilitates voting for citizens in this category.
- E. The South Dakota Democratic Party is supporting efforts to make voter registration easier, including supporting: (Rule 2.I.2)
 - 1. Voter registration modernization, including online voter registration and automatic and same-day registration; (Rule 2.I.2.a)
 - The SDDP in coordination with our elected state legislators has been submitting legislation over the past couple of years for both online and automatic voter registration. The SDDP has been in conversation with various activist groups to possibly put both of these issues on the ballot. Currently SD has 4 weeks of same-day registration that lasts until 15 days before the election. We actively promote and encourage voters and potential voters to go vote at that time.
 - 2. Pre-registration of high school students so that they are already registered once they reach

voting age; (Rule 2.I.2.b)

- The SDDP directs field staff to present information about voting and the electoral process to high school students in their areas. Following the end of the presentations, the field staffer encourages and registers students to vote if they are of age, and they also pre-register students that will be 18 prior to the election. Additionally, the SDDP has been working with local school boards to encourage them to promote voter registration in school whether it be registration forms in school classrooms or administrative offices.
- 3. Restoration of voting rights to all people who have served the time for their criminal conviction, without requiring the payment of court fees or fines; and (Rule 2.I.2.c)
 - The SDDP actively registers voters who have served time for their criminal convictions. In previous cycles, SDDP staff have coordinated with law enforcement facilities to coordinate transportation for people with criminal convictions to vote in elections.
- 4. Same-day or automatic registration of voters for the Democratic presidential nominating process. (Rule 2.I.2.d).
 - Currently state law requires voters to be registered 15 days before an election. That deadline requires each County Auditor to receive a voter registration form fifteen (15) days before the election. The deadline for the June 2, 2020 primary will be 5 pm on May 19, 2020. The SDDP has been working to pass legislation that would allow for both same-day or automatic registration. Voter registration forms will be available at all delegate meetings.
- F. The South Dakota Democratic Party has taken steps to ensure an open and inclusive process and resist attempts at voter suppression and disenfranchisement (Rule 2.J and Rule 2.J.1).
 - 1. Starting in 2010, the South Dakota Democratic Party has included registered Independents and NPA (No Party Affiliation) in the South Dakota Democratic Primary. While we traditionally do not have a great number of Democratic primaries for statewide office, this change evidences the value of inclusiveness with Independent voters, the fastest growing group of registered voters in South Dakota. While some Democratic activists have suggested that this has diminished the incentive to register as a Democrat, we have resisted those challenging this decision, and seeking to disenfranchise this group of voters in the selection of Democratic candidates on the primary ballot.
 - 2. The South Dakota Democratic Party (SDDP) stood ready to challenge error and fraud to vote absentee or vote early. We vigorously opposed HB 1178 in the 2019 SD Legislature which would have revised provisions regarding the beginning period for absentee voting. It basically would have shortened the absentee voting period from 46 to 14 days. The Democratic Caucus of the SD Legislature was united in opposing this bill. Through the SDDP Communications Director, we enlisted the help of over 500 members of our *Rapid Response Team* to challenge this law. We joined with the GOP Secretary of State in opposing this change in access to early voting. While this did pass in the SD House in 2019, it was defeated in the Senate State Affairs 8-1.

- 3. SDDP incorporated mechanisms with reasonable safeguards against error and fraud to vote absentee or vote early. Starting April 1,2019, we employed a full-time staffer in Tribal Organizing. This staff position has primary responsibility for reaching out to South Dakota Tribal members and ensuring that they have access to the ballot through education, inclusion, year-round relationships, and emphasis on issues that matter to this important constituency.
- 4. The South Dakota Secretary of State website publically reports the total statewide and county level results for each candidate in the first determining step which is the primary held on June 2, 2020. The results are further reported for each precinct within the county. The June 2, 2020 Primary results will determine the allocation of all national delegates, rounded to the nearest whole number, subject to recount.
- 5. The standard for an automatic recount in South Dakota is a margin not exceeding one-fourth of one percent of the total of votes cast for two slates of presidential delegates.
- 6. South Dakota voters who are unable to participate in person (such as those serving in the military, those with a disability or illness, or anyone who wishes to vote by absentee regardless of the reason) may vote by absentee. The deadline to submit an absentee ballot application is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the Election. South Dakota law required the ballot to be received by the county auditor before the polls close on Election Day.
- 7. Military Vote by Absentee Request Online:

In 2008 the Military and Overseas Voter Empowerment Act (MOVE) was passed and South Dakota became the first system specifically designed for uniformed and overseas voters. This UOCAVA system was named after the Uniformed and Overseas Absentee Voting Act, which turned a 60 day process into a 24 hour transaction. The UOCAVA system allows all military and overseas voters to submit their absentee ballot application electronically and receive their absentee ballot electronically.

The UOCAVA system was used for the first time in the 2010 general election and continued to be used in the 2012, 2014, 2016 and 2018 elections.

The UOCAVA system requires the voter to print their absentee ballot and mail the ballot back to the county auditor. For military voters, the US Department of Defense provides expedited mail service for free from anywhere in the world.

- G. Scheduling of Delegate Selection Meetings-General Provisions
 - 1. The dates, times and places for all official Party meetings and events related to the state's delegate selection process will be scheduled to encourage the participation of all Democrats. Such meetings will begin and end at reasonable hours. In addition, the scheduling of meetings shall consider any religious observations that could significantly affect participation. (Rule 3.A & Reg. 4.)
 - 2. Working with the Affirmative Action Committee the South Dakota Democratic Party will provide

for the proper education and outreach to ensure accessibility, including specifically for people with disabilities and for people with limited English proficiency in accordance with the Americans With Disabilities Act and Sections 203 and 208 of the Voting Rights Act. (Rule 2.K.9)

Section II Presidential Candidates

A. Ballot Access

- 1. A presidential candidate gains access to the South Dakota presidential preference primary ballot by the candidate, the committee or the group supporting the candidate in any of the presidential primaries notifying the Secretary of State with a letter that said candidate, committee or group intends to have the name of the candidate placed on the South Dakota presidential primary ballot.
- 2. The deadline for submission of this letter is 5 p.m. on the last Tuesday in March. (March 31,2020) and may be filed after Jan. 1, 2020. This is established by state law. (SDCL 12-6-4) (Rules 1.A.7)
- 3. Each presidential candidate shall certify in writing to the State Democratic Chair, the name(s) of his or her authorized representative(s) by March 10, 2020. (Rule 12.D.(1)
- 4. Each presidential candidate (including uncommitted status) shall use his or her best efforts to ensure that his or her respective delegation within the state delegation achieves the affirmative action goals established by this Plan and is equally divided between men and women. (Rule 6.1.)
- 5. The Executive Director shall review all filings submitted by presidential candidates and shall convene a meeting of the Affirmative Action Committee at 4 p.m. CST on March 30, 2020, and certify the names of the Presidential candidates by 5 p.m. CST. The Executive Chair may recommend the rejection of a candidate filing to the Affirmative Action Committee for any of the following reasons: a. The presidential candidate is not a Democrat; or b. The presidential candidate has withdrawn from the Presidential race subsequent to filing; or c. The presidential candidate fails to meet the definition in Section VI of the Call to the 2020 Democratic National Convention, issued by the Democratic National Committee and Rule 12.K. of the 2020 Delegate Selection Rules.
- 6. Recount provisions: Whenever according to the official returns as publicly announced and compiled by the Secretary of State, that one group of candidates for presidential electors has been elected over another group of such candidates by a margin not exceeding one-fourth of one percent of the total of votes cast for both such groups, the Chair of the South Dakota Democratic Party may file with the secretary of state at any time after the election and prior to the canvass by the State Board of Canvassers, a petition setting forth that in the opinion of the petitioner or petitioners all votes cast for presidential electors should be recounted. (SDCL 12-21-15)

B. Other Requirements

"Uncommitted" may appear on the ballot if such a slate is elected at the Statewide Democratic Caucus on March 21, 2020. There are no write-in options on the South Dakota primary or General Election ballot.

Section III Selection of Delegates and Alternates

A. Statewide Delegates and Alternates

- 1. South Dakota is allocated 19 district-level delegates and 2 district-level alternates. (Rule 8.C, Call I.B, I.I, & Appendix B)
- 2. South Dakota has one Congressional District and 35 state legislative districts. The South Dakota Democratic Party has divided its organization on its Executive Board into seven Regions, each comprised of five legislative districts. On Sat. March 14, 2020, each of the seven Regions will hold a Regional Caucus and elect delegates to represent that Region at the Statewide Caucus to be held in Pierre (centrally located) on Sat. March 21, 2020.
- 3. The slate of delegates and alternates for each presidential candidate shall be elected by a pre-primary Statewide Caucus held on March 21,2010 in Pierre, SD. The statewide primary will be held on June 2, 2020.
- 4. Apportionment of Regional Delegates to Attend the Statewide Caucus
 - a. South Dakota has one Congressional District. The South Dakota Democratic Party delegates and alternates are first apportioned among the seven Regional Caucuses based on a formula giving equal weight to the vote for the Democratic candidates in the 2016 presidential and the most recent gubernatorial elections. (See supporting document Attachment 4). This method will ensure the most inclusive method for allocating delegates representing each of the seven Regional Caucuses and will fairly represents Democratic voter strength in each of the seven regions. The following table reflects regional delegate allocation. At the first regional level caucus only, elected regional delegates need not be equally divided between men and women.

5. Statewide Caucus to Select Delegates

- a. The purpose of the statewide caucus to be held on March 21, 2020 in Pierre, SD (centrally located) is to select the delegate and alternate slate whose names will physically appear on the June 2, 2020 SD Primary ballot. The number of men and the number of women in the state's total number of elected statewide delegates and alternates will not vary by more than one. (Rule 6.C.1 & Reg. 4.9)
- b. At the Statewide Caucus, the first round of voting will determine the delegate with the highest rank and the first name on the delegate slate for each presidential candidate. Voting shall than alternate between men and women until all 9 statewide delegates are determined for each presidential candidate. (5 women and 4 men or 5 men and 4 women). Once the slate of nine has been determined, the delegates will elect one male and one female alternate for each presidential candidate.
- c. Alternates for each presidential candidate will be nominated at the statewide caucus on March 21, 2020 in Pierre. Alternates are only selected based on the results of the June 2, 2019 primary. There are no alternates selected at the State Convention for PLEO or At-large Delegates.
- 6. District-Level Delegate and Alternate Filing Requirements
 - a. At the first level of Regional caucus, anyone registered as a Democratic voter by or on March 14 and registered to vote in one of the five legislative districts in that specific Region is eligible to participate.
 - (1) An individual can qualify as a candidate for statewide delegate or alternate to the 2020 Democratic National Convention by filing a statement of candidacy designating their singular presidential (or uncommitted) preference and a signed pledge of support for the presidential candidate (including uncommitted status) with the State Party between Feb. 10 and 5 pm CST on March 9, 2020. A delegate or alternate candidate may modify their singular presidential preference by submitting an updated pledge of support no later than the filing deadline of March 9, 2020. (Rule 13.B, Rule 15.F & Reg. 4.23)
 - (2) There is no filing fee. An example of the presidential preference form is provided in Attachment 6 of this Delegate Selection Plan. The preference form will be available at all Democratic meetings and events, and be promoted through social media and other forms of outreach to interested parties. The preference form may be printed and must have a signature. It may be mailed or scanned and emailed to the South

Dakota Democratic Party and must arrive prior to 5 pm on Monday, Mar. 9,2020 SDDP, PO Box 1485, Sioux Falls, SD 57101; Send email to Finance & Events Director Megan Forster (megan@sddp.org).(Rule 1.A.7, Rule 1.A.8 & Reg. 4.23)

- b. All candidates considered for statewide alternate positions must meet the same requirements as candidates for statewide delegate positions. (Rule 13.C)
- 5. Presidential Candidate Right of Review for District-Level Delegates and Alternates
 - a. The State Democratic Chair shall convey to the presidential candidate, or that candidate's authorized representative(s), not later than March 10, 2020 (5 pm CT) a list of all persons who have filed for delegate or alternate pledged to that presidential candidate. (Rule 13.D & Rule 13.F).
 - b. Following the seven Regional Caucuses on March 14, 2020, and not later than March 16 (5 pm CT) the State Democratic Chair shall convey to the presidential candidate, or that candidates' authorized representative(s) a list of all persons who have been elected to represent that presidential candidate from each Region at the Statewide Caucus on March 21, 2020. Each presidential candidate shall then provide to the SDDP, and no later than 5pm (CT) on Friday, March 20, 2020, a list of all approved delegates. The presidential candidate must approve a number of delegate candidates or alternate candidates equal to or greater than the number of delegates or alternates allocated to the state. (Rule 13.E.1)
 - c. Following the statewide Caucus on March 21, 2020 and the selection of the slate for each presidential candidate, and not later than March 23, 2020 (5 pm CT) the State Democratic Chair shall convey to the presidential candidate, or that candidates' authorized representatives(s) a list of all delegates and alternates who have been elected to represent that presidential candidate and whose names will appear on the SD Primary ballot.
 - d. Each presidential candidate shall certify in writing to the State Democratic Chair, the name(s) of his or her authorized representative(s) by March 24, 2020.
 - e. The State Democratic Chair will submit the names of each Presidential candidates slate to the SD Secretary of State so it is received no later than the last Tuesday in March (March 31, 2020).
 - f. Failure to respond will be deemed approval of all delegate and alternate candidates submitted to the presidential candidate unless the presidential candidate, or the authorized representative(s), signifies otherwise in writing to the State Democratic Chair not later than March 24, 2020.

- g. National convention delegate and alternate candidates removed from the list of bona fide supporters by a presidential candidate, or that candidate's authorized representative(s), may not be elected as a delegate or alternate at that level pledged to that presidential candidate. (Rule 13.E & Reg. 4.24)
- h. The State Democratic Chair shall certify in writing to the Co-Chairs of the DNC Rules and Bylaws Committee whether each presidential candidate has used their best efforts to ensure that their respective district-level delegate candidates and district-level alternate candidates meet the affirmative action and outreach and inclusion considerations and goals detailed in the Affirmative Action section of this Plan within three (3) business days of returning the list of approved district-level delegate candidates and district-level alternate candidates as indicated in Section III.A.5.b of this Plan. (Rule 6.1 & Reg.4.10.C)

6. Fair Reflection of Presidential Preference

a. Presidential Primary - Proportional Representation Plan

South Dakota has a presidential primary election and is a "binding" primary. Accordingly, delegate and alternate positions shall be allocated so as to fairly reflect the expressed presidential (or uncommitted) preference of the primary voters in each district. The National Convention delegates and alternates selected at the district level shall be allocated in proportion to the percentage of the primary vote won in that district by each preference, except that preferences falling below a 15% threshold shall not be awarded any delegates or alternates. (Rule 14.A, Rule 14.B & Rule 14.D)

- b. On the June 2, 2020 primary, if no presidential preference reaches a 15% threshold, the threshold shall be half the percentage of the vote received in that district by the front-runner. (Rule 14.F)
- 7. Equal Division of District-Level Delegates and Alternates
 - a. To ensure the South Dakota delegates are equally divided between men and women (determined by gender self-identification) delegate positions at the Statewide Caucus on March 21, 2020 will be designated for each presidential preference beginning with the highest vote-getting. This assignment of delegate positions, will continue with the next highest vote-getting preferences in descending order, with positions assigned to either male and female alternating by gender as mathematically practicable, until the gender of each position has been assigned. In the case of non-binary gender delegates, they shall not be counted in either the male or female category. (Rule 6.C., Rule 6.C.1 & Reg. 4.10)
 - b. After the delegates are selected, the alternates will be awarded, using the same process described above.
 - 8. The State Democratic Chair shall certify in writing to the Secretary of the Democratic National Committee (DNC) the election of the state's district-level delegates and alternates to the Democratic National Convention within 10 days after the election results are certified. In South

Dakota, the Secretary of State will certify the primary election with the Election Board 7 days following the primary (June 9, 2020).(Reg. 5.4.B & Reg. 5.4.C)

B. Automatic Delegates

- 1. Automatic Party Leaders and Elected Officials
 - a. The following categories (if applicable) shall constitute the Automatic Party Leaders and Elected Official delegate positions:
 - (1) Members of the Democratic National Committee who legally reside in the state. This includes the South Dakota Democratic Party Chair, Vice Chair, Committeewoman and Committeeman. (Rule 9.A.1, Call I.F, Call I.J, & Reg. 4.15).
 - (2) Democratic President and Democratic Vice President (if applicable); (Rule 9.A.2 & Call I.G)
 - (3) All of State's Democratic Members of the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate; (Rule 9.A.3, Call I.H & Call I.J)
 - (4) The Democratic Governor (if applicable); (Rule 9.A.4, Call I.H & Call I.J)
 - (5) "Distinguished Party Leader" delegates (if applicable); [Persons who qualify as "Distinguished Party Leader" delegates are: all former Democratic Presidents or Vice Presidents, all former Democratic Leaders of the U.S. Senate, all former Democratic Speakers of the U.S. House of Representatives and Democratic Minority Leaders, as applicable, and all former Chairs of the Democratic National Committee.] In South Dakota, this includes Sen. Tom Daschle (Rule 9.A.5, Call I.G & Reg. 4.14)
 - b. An Automatic delegate may run and be elected as a Pledged delegate. If an Automatic delegate is elected and certified as a Pledged delegate, that individual shall not serve as an Automatic delegate at the 2020 National Convention. (Call I.J)
 - c. The certification process for the Automatic Party Leader and Elected Official delegates is as follows:
 - (1) Not later than March 6, 2020, the Secretary of the Democratic National Committee shall officially confirm to the State Democratic Chair the names of the Automatic delegates who legally reside in State. (Rule 9.A)
 - (2) Official confirmation by the Secretary shall constitute verification of the Automatic delegates from the categories indicated above. (Call IV.B.1)
 - (3) The State Democratic Chair shall certify in writing to the Secretary of the DNC the presidential preference of state's Automatic delegates 10 days after the completion of the State's Delegate Selection Process. (Call IV.C)

2. For purposes of achieving equal division between delegate men and delegate women within the state's entire convention delegation (determined by gender self-identification), the entire delegation includes all pledged and Automatic delegates, including those who identify as male or female. (Rule 6.C and Reg. 4.9)

C. Pledged Party Leader and Elected Official (PLEO) Delegates

1. South Dakota is allotted 2 pledged Party Leader and Elected Official (PLEO) delegates. (Call I.D, Call I.E & Appendix B)

2. Pledged PLEO Delegate Filing Requirements

- a. Individuals shall be eligible for the pledged Party Leader and Elected Official delegate positions according to the following priority: big city mayors and state-wide elected officials (to be given equal consideration); state legislative leaders, state legislators, and other state, county and local elected officials and party leaders. Automatic delegates who choose to run for PLEO delegate will be given equal consideration with big city mayors and state-wide elected officials. (Rule 10.A.1 & Reg. 4.16)
- b. An individual can qualify as a candidate for a position as a pledged PLEO delegate by filing a signed declaration of candidacy with the State Party Chair, 1737 S. Cleveland, Sioux Falls, SD 57105, by noon CST on June 12, 2020. This statement of candidacy must designate the singular presidential preference of the individual. Individuals for pledged PLEO must also file along with his or her declaration of candidacy, a pledge of support for the presidential candidate said delegate-candidate favors, if he or she has not already made known his or her presidential preference or uncommitted status as a candidate for district-level or atlarge or district–level alternative. A pledge may be modified and an individual may submit an updated pledge of support before the filing deadline. (Rule 10.A.3, Rule 15.G, Reg. 4.18 & Reg. 4.17)

3. Presidential Candidate Right of Review

- a. The State Democratic Chair shall convey to the presidential candidate, or that candidate's authorized representative(s), not later than 5 pm CT on June 12, 2020, a list of all persons who have filed for a party and elected official delegate pledged to that presidential candidate. (Rule 10.A.3 & Rule 13.D)
- b. Each presidential candidate, or that candidate's authorized representative(s), must file with the State Democratic Chair, by 5 pm CT on June 16, 2020, a list of all such candidates they have approved, as long as approval is given to at least one (1) name or two (2) names for every position to which the presidential candidate is entitled. (Rule 13.E.2 & Reg. 4.25)
- c. Failure to respond will be deemed approval of all delegate candidates submitted to the presidential candidate unless the presidential candidate or the authorized representative(s) signifies otherwise in writing to the State Democratic Chair not later than 5 pm CT on June 16, 2020. (Rule 13.D)

- d. The State Democratic Chair shall certify in writing to the Co-Chairs of the DNC Rules and Bylaws Committee whether each presidential candidate has used their best efforts to ensure that their respective pledged PLEO delegate candidates meet the affirmative action and outreach and inclusion considerations and goals detailed in the Affirmative Action section of this Plan within three (3) business days of returning the list of approved pledged PLEO candidates as indicated in Section III.C.3.b of this Plan. (Rule 6.1 & Reg. 4.10.C)
- 4. Selection of Pledged Party Leader and Elected Official Delegates
 - a. The pledged PLEO slots shall be allocated among presidential preferences on the same basis as the at-large delegates. (Rule 10.A.2, Rule 11.C, Rule 14.E & Rule 14.F)
 - b. Selection of the pledged PLEO delegates will occur at the SD Democratic State Convention on June 20, 2020 (location TBD), which is after the election of district-level delegates and alternates and prior to the selection of at-large delegates. (Rule 10.A)
 - c. Voting delegates at the SDDP Convention are selected in compliance with the equal division requirements of Article 9, Section 16 of the Charter of the Democratic Party of the United States. This includes open and publicized meetings, and delegate apportionment based on each county's Democratic strength. (Rule 10.B.1 & Reg. 4.18.A)
 - d. This goal of delegate apportionment based on Democratic strength is provided for in the SD Democratic Party Constitution. Article IX, Section 2: Each county central committee shall send to the state convention delegates. Each County shall be entitled to a minimum of four delegates, one being the county chair or the next higher officer and three being elected. In addition, the county shall elect one delegate for every 1,500 votes (or major fraction thereof) over 4,000 votes cast in that county in the last general election for the Democratic candidate for governor.

<u>And</u> Article IX, Section 7: As prescribed by South Dakota law SDCL 12-5-18, such delegates shall vote the number of votes equal to his or her proportionate representation as all delegates present from that county bears to the number of votes in his or her county at the last general election for the Democratic Party candidate for governor.

f. Members of the State Party Central Committee shall have been elected no earlier than the calendar year of the previous national convention with each county holding officer elections between April 1 and May 31, 2019. Other county delegates to the 2020 State Convention will be elected between March 1 and June 5, 2020. (Rule 10.B.4 & Reg. 4.18.B)

- g. The election of PLEO delegates shall be the second to last order of business at the Convention and shall be conducted as follows:
 - Explanation of the number of positions to be filled and review of affirmative action goals.
 - Nominations for positions to be filled.
 - This election shall <u>not</u> be by secret ballot.
- h. Alternates are not selected at the pledged Party Leader and Elected Official level. (Rule 10.A.3)
- 5. The State Democratic Chair shall certify in writing to the Secretary of the Democratic National Committee the election of the state's pledged Party Leader and Elected Official delegates to the Democratic National Convention within 10 days after their election. (Call IV.A & Reg. 5.4.A)

D. At-Large Delegates and Alternates

- 1. The state of South Dakota is allotted 3 at-large delegates and 0 at-large alternates who will be elected at the State Party Convention June 19-20,2020. (Rule 8.C, Call I.B, II, Appendix B & Reg. 4.34)
- 2. At-Large Delegate and Alternate Filing Requirements
 - a. Persons desiring to seek at-large delegate may file a statement of candidacy designating their singular presidential (or uncommitted preference) and a signed pledge of support for the presidential candidates by filing a signed declaration of candidacy with the State Party Chair, 1737 S. Cleveland, Sioux Falls, SD 57105, by noon CST on June 12, 2020. This statement of candidacy must designate the singular presidential preference of the individual. A pledge may be modified and an individual may submit an updated pledge of support before the filing deadline.
 - b. Selection of the pledged At-large delegates will occur at the SD Democratic State Convention on June 20, 2020 (location TBD), which is after the election of district-level delegates and alternates and after the selection of PLEO delegates (*Rule 10.A*) A delegate candidate may modify their singular presidential preference by submitting an updated pledge of support no later than the filing deadline by noon CST on June 12, 2020. (*Rule 13.A., Rule 13.B, Rule 15.G, Reg. 4.22, Reg. 4.23, & Reg. 4.31*)
 - c. Alternates are not selected at the SDDP Convention for At-large Delegates.
- 3. Presidential Candidate Right of Review
 - a. The State Democratic Chair shall convey to the presidential candidate, or that candidate's authorized representative(s), not later than 5 pm CST on June 12, 2020, a list of all persons who have filed for at-large delegate pledged to that presidential candidate. (Rule 13.D)
 - b. Each presidential candidate, or that candidate's authorized representative(s), must file with the State Democratic Chair, immediately after the election of the PLEO delegates

on June 20, 2020, a list of all such candidates he or she has approved, as long as approval is given to at least one (1) name for every position to which the presidential candidate is entitled. (Rule 13.D.4, Rule 13.E.2 & Reg. 4.25)

- c. Failure to respond will be deemed approval of all delegate candidates submitted to the presidential candidate unless the presidential candidate or the authorized representative(s) signifies otherwise in writing to the State Democratic Chair not later than 3 pm (CT) June 20,2020, immediately after the election of the PLEO delegates.
- d. The State Democratic Chair shall certify in writing to the Co-Chairs of the DNC Rules and Bylaws Committee whether each presidential candidate has used their best efforts to ensure that their respective at-large delegate candidates and at-large alternate candidates meet the affirmative action and outreach and inclusion considerations and goals detailed in the Affirmative Action and Outreach and Inclusion section of this Plan within three (3) business days of returning the list of approved at-large delegate candidates as indicated in this Section.

4. Fair Reflection of Presidential Preference

- a. At-large delegate positions shall be allocated among presidential preferences according to the state-wide primary vote. (Rule 11.C)
- b. Preferences which have not attained a 15% threshold on a state-wide basis shall not be entitled to any at-large delegates. (Rule 14.E)
- c. If no presidential preference reaches a 15% threshold, the threshold shall be half the percentage of the statewide vote received by the front-runner. (Rule 14.F)
- d. If a presidential candidate otherwise entitled to an allocation is no longer a candidate at the time of selection of the at-large delegates, their allocation will be proportionally divided among the other preferences entitled to an allocation. (Rule 11.C)

5. Selection of At-Large Delegates

- a. The selection of the at-large delegates and alternates will occur at the SD Democratic Party Convention on June 20, 2020 [location TBD], at a time which is after all pledged Party Leader and Elected Official delegates have been selected.
- b. Specific information regarding open process and evidence of Democratic strength is already provided under the PLEO section. (Refer to C.4 a-f).
- c. Membership of the State Party Central Committee complies with the equal division requirements of Article 9, Section 16 of the Charter of the Democratic Party of the United States. Each County selects four voting members to the State Central Committee, a Chair

and Vice Chair (opposite gender) a Committeeman and Committeewoman. (Rule 10.B.5 & Reg. 4.18.C)

d. Priority of Consideration

- (1) In the selection of the at-large delegation priority of consideration shall be given to African Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, Disabled and women, if such priority of consideration is needed to fulfill the affirmative action goals outlined in the state's Delegate Selection Plan. (Rule 6.A.3)
- (2) To continue the Democratic Party's ongoing efforts to include groups historically under-represented in the Democratic Party's affairs and to assist in the achievement of full participation by these groups, priority of consideration shall be given other groups by virtue of race, sex, age, color, creed, national origin, religion, ethnic identify, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, economic status or disability. (Rule 5.C, Rule 6.A.3, Rule 7 & Reg. 4.8)
- (3) The election of at-large delegates shall be used, if necessary, to achieve the equal division of positions between men and women as far as mathematically practicable, and may be used to achieve the representation goals established in the Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program section of this Plan. (Rule 6.A, Rule 6.C and Reg. 4.9)
- (4) There are no at-large alternates elected at the SDDP Convention.
- 6. The State Democratic Chair shall certify in writing to the Secretary of the Democratic National Committee the election of the state's at-large delegates to the Democratic National Convention within 10 days after their election. (Rule 8.C & Call IV.A)

E. Replacement of Delegates and Alternates

- 1. A pledged delegate or alternate may be replaced according to the following guidelines:
 - a. Permanent Replacement of a Delegate: (Rule 19.D.3)
 - (1) A permanent replacement occurs when a delegate resigns or dies prior to or during the national convention and the alternate replaces the delegate for the remainder of the National Convention.
 - (2) Any alternate permanently replacing a delegate shall be of the same presidential preference (including uncommitted status) and gender of the delegate they replace.
 - (a) In the case where the presidential candidate has only one (1) alternate, that alternate shall become the certified delegate.

- (b) If a presidential candidate has only one (1) alternate, and that alternate permanently replaces a delegate of a different gender, thereby causing the delegation to no longer be equally divided, the delegation shall not be considered in violation of Rule 6.C. In such a case, notwithstanding Rule 19.D.2, the State Party Committee shall, at the time of a subsequent permanent replacement, replace a delegate with a person of a different gender, in order to return the delegation to equal division of men and women. (Reg. 4.36)
- (3) If a delegate or alternate candidate who has been elected but not certified to the DNC Secretary resigns, dies, or is no longer eligible to serve, they shall be replaced, after consultation with the State Party, by the authorized representative of the presidential candidate to whom they are pledged. (Rule 19.D.2)
- b. Temporary Replacement of a Delegate: (Rule 19.D.4)
 - (1) A temporary replacement occurs when a delegate is to be absent for a limited period of time during the convention and an alternate temporarily acts in the delegate's place.
 - (2) Any alternate who temporarily replaces a delegate must be of the same presidential preference (including uncommitted status) as the delegate they replace, and to the extent possible shall be of the same gender and from the same political subdivision within the state as the delegate.
- c. The approval of a majority of the delegation will be used to select permanent and temporary replacements of delegates (*Rule 19.D.1*).
- d. Certification of Replacements
 - (1) Any alternate who permanently replaces a delegate shall be certified in writing to the Secretary of the DNC by the State Democratic Chair. (Rule 19.D.3)
 - (2) Permanent replacement of a delegate (as specified above) by an alternate and replacement of a vacant alternate position shall be certified in writing by the State's Democratic Chair to the Secretary of the Democratic National Committee within three (3) days after the replacement is selected. (Call IV.D.1)
 - (3) Certification of permanent replacements will be accepted by the Secretary up to 72 hours before the first official session of the Convention is scheduled to convene. (Call IV.D.1 & Reg. 4.35)
 - (4) In the case where a pledged delegate is permanently replaced after 72 hours before the time the first session is scheduled to convene or, in the case where a pledged delegate is not on the floor of the Convention Hall at the time a roll call vote is taken, an alternate may be designated (as specified above) to cast the delegate's vote. In such case, the Delegation Chair shall indicate the name of the alternate casting the

respective delegate's vote on the delegation tally sheet. (Call IX.F.3.e, Call IX.F.3.c & Reg. 5.6)

- d. A vacant alternate position shall be filled by the delegation. The replacement shall be of the same presidential preference (or uncommitted status), and of the same gender as the alternate being replaced. (Rule 19.E)
- 2. Automatic delegates shall not be entitled to a replacement, nor shall the state be entitled to a replacement, except under the following circumstances: (Call IV.D.2 & Reg. 4.37)
 - a. Members of the Democratic National Committee shall not be entitled to a replacement, nor shall the state be entitled to a replacement, except in the case of death of such delegates. In the case where the state's DNC membership changes following the DNC Secretary's official confirmation, but prior to the commencement of the 2020 Democratic National Convention, acknowledgment by the Secretary of the new DNC member certification shall constitute verification of the corresponding change of Automatic delegates. (Call, IV.D.2.b)
 - b. Automatic distinguished Party Leader delegates allocated to the state pursuant to Rule 9.A.(5), shall not be entitled to name a replacement, nor shall the state be entitled to name a replacement. (Call IV.D.2.c)
 - c. In no case may an alternate cast a vote for an Automatic delegate. (Call IX.F.3.e)

Section IV Selection of Convention Standing Committee Members

A. Introduction

- South Dakota has been allocated (1) member(s) on each of the three (3) standing committees for the 2020 Democratic National Convention (Credentials, Platform and Rules), for a total of 3 members. (Call VII.A & Appendix D)
- 2. Members of the Convention Standing Committees need not be delegates or alternates to the 2020 Democratic National Convention. (Call VII.A.3)
- 3. These members will be selected in accordance with the procedures indicated below. (Rule 1.G)

B. Standing Committee Members

- 1. Selection Meeting
 - a. The members of the standing committees allocated to South Dakota shall be elected by a quorum of State's National Convention delegates, at a meeting to be held on immediately following the adjournment of the 2020 State Convention on June 20, 2020. (Call VII.B.1)

b. All members of the delegation shall receive adequate notice of the time, date and place of the meeting to select the standing committee members. (Call VII.B.1)

2. Allocation of Members

- a. The members of the standing committees allocated to State shall proportionately represent the presidential preference of all candidates (including uncommitted status) receiving the threshold percentage used in the state's delegation to calculate the at-large apportionment pursuant to Rule 14.E. of the Delegate Selection Rules. (Call VII.C.1 & Reg. 5.9)
- b. The presidential preference of each candidate receiving the applicable percentage or more within the delegation shall be multiplied by the total number of standing committee positions allocated to South Dakota. If the result of such multiplication does not equal 0.455 or above, the presidential preference in question is not entitled to representation on the standing committee. If the result of such multiplication is 0.455 but less than 1.455, the presidential preference is entitled to one (1) position. Those preferences securing more than 1.455 but less than 2.455 are entitled to two (2) positions, etc. (Call VII.C.2)
- c. Where the application of this formula results in the total allocation exceeding the total number of committee positions, the presidential candidate whose original figure of representation is farthest from its eventual rounded-off total shall be denied that one (1) additional position. Where the application of this formula results in the total allocation falling short of the total number of committee positions, the presidential candidate whose original figure of representation is closest to the next rounding level shall be allotted an additional committee position. (Call VII.C.3)
- d. Standing committee positions allocated to a presidential candidate shall be proportionately allocated, to the extent practicable, to each of the three (3) standing committees. When such allocation results in an unequal distribution of standing committee positions by candidate preference, a drawing shall be conducted to distribute the additional positions. (Call VII.C.4)

3. Presidential Candidate Right of Review

- a. Each presidential candidate, or that candidate's authorized representative(s)shall be given adequate notice of the date, time and location of the meeting of the state's delegation authorized to elect standing committee members. (Call VII.D.1)
- b. Each presidential candidate, or that candidate's authorized representative(s), must submit to the State Democratic Chair, by 5 pm CST pm June 20, 2020 after all delegates are selected, a minimum of (1) name for each slot awarded to that candidate for members of each committee. The delegation shall select the standing committee members from among names submitted by the presidential candidates (including uncommitted status). Presidential candidates shall not be required to submit the name of more than one (1) person for each slot awarded to such candidate for members of standing committees. (Call VII.D.2)

4. Selection Procedure to Achieve Equal Division

- a. Presidential candidates (including uncommitted status) shall use their best efforts to ensure that their respective delegation of standing committee members shall achieve State's affirmative action, outreach and inclusion goals and that their respective male and female members are equally divided between the men and women determined by gender self-identification. (Rule 6.1 & Reg. 4.10)
- b. South Dakota will use the following provisions to achieve equal division of its standing committee members.
 - (1) A separate election shall be conducted for membership on each standing committee.
 - (2) The male and female membership of the standing committees shall be as equally divided among the men and women as possible under the state allocation; the variance between men and women in any committee or among the three committees in aggregate shall not exceed one. (Call VII.E.2)
 - (3) Gender non-binary committee members shall not be counted as either a male or female, and the remainder of the delegation shall be equally divided between male gender (men) and female gender (women). (Call VII.E.1)
 - (4) The positions allocated to each presidential candidate on each committee shall be voted on separately, and the winners shall be the highest vote-getter(s) of the appropriate gender.

5. Certification and Substitution

- a. The State Democratic Chair shall certify the standing committee members in writing to the Secretary of the Democratic National Committee within three (3) days after their selection. (Call VII.B.3)
- b. No substitutions will be permitted in the case of standing committee members, except in the case of resignation or death. Substitutions must be made in accordance with the rules and the election procedures specified in this section, and must be certified in writing to the Secretary of the Democratic National Committee within three (3) days after the substitute member is selected but not later than 48 hours before the respective standing committee meets, except in the case of death. (Call VII.B.4)

Section V Delegation Chair and Convention Pages

A. Introduction

State will select one (1) person to serve as Delegation Chair and 2 to serve as Convention Pages. (Call IV.E, Call IV.F.1 & Appendix C)

B. Delegation Chair

1. Selection Meeting

- a. The Delegation Chair shall be selected by a quorum of the state's National Convention Delegates, at a meeting to be held on immediately following adjournment of the State Convention on June 20, 2020. (Call IV.E & Call VII.B.1)
- b. All members of the delegation shall receive timely notice of the time, date and place of the meeting to select the Delegation Chair. (Rule 3.C)
- 2. The State Democratic Chair shall certify the Delegation Chair in writing to the Secretary of the Democratic National Committee within three (3) days after their selection. (Call IV.E)

C. Convention Pages

- 1. 2 individuals will be selected to serve as State's Convention Pages by the State Democratic Chair in consultation with the members of the Democratic National Committee from the state. This selection will take place immediately following adjournment of the State Convention on June 20, 2020. (Call IV.F.3, Appendix C & Reg. 5.7)
- 2. The Convention Pages shall be as evenly divided between men and women (determined by self-identification) as possible under the state allocation and shall reflect as much as possible, the Affirmative Action and Outreach and Inclusion guidelines in the state plan. In the case of gender non-binary pages, they shall not be counted as either a male or female, and the remainder of the pages shall be equally divided. (*Reg. 5.7.A*)
- 3. The State Democratic Chair shall certify the individuals to serve as State's Convention Pages in writing to the Secretary of the Democratic National Committee within three (3) days after the selection. (Call IV.F.3 & Reg. 5.7.B)

Section VI Presidential Electors

A. Introduction

South Dakota will select 3 persons to serve as Presidential Electors for the 2020 Presidential election.

B. Selection of Presidential Electors

- 1. The Presidential Electors shall be selected by the voting delegates of the 2020 South Dakota Democratic Convention on June 20, 2020 (location TBD). Each of the candidates are nominated by a delegate to the Convention. Democratic electors must be elected by a majority vote of the votes cast at the Convention and shall be certified to the secretary of state by the officers of the convention, within three days of the close of the convention. (SDCL 12-5-22)
- 2. The electors of President and Vice President shall, at twelve noon on the day which is or may be directed by the Congress of the United States, meet at the seat of government of this state and then and there perform the duties enjoined upon them by the Constitution and laws of the United States. (SDCL 12-24-4)

C. Affirmation

- 1. Each candidate for Presidential Elector shall certify in writing that they will vote for the election of the Democratic Presidential and Vice Presidential nominees. (Call VIII)
- 2. In the selection of the Presidential Electors, the State Party will take the following steps to ensure the persons selected are bona fide Democrats who are faithful to the interests, welfare, and success of the Democratic Party of the United States, who subscribe to the substance, intent and principles of the Charter and the Bylaws of the Democratic Party of the United States:
 - Verify that the elector is a registered Democratic voter
 - Record in writing that the elector will vote for the Democratic Presidential and Vice Presidential nominee
 - South Dakota state law does not require electors to vote for the Party's nominee.

Section VII General Provisions and Procedural Guarantees

- A. The South Dakota Democratic Party reaffirms its commitment to an open party by incorporating the "six basic elements" as listed below. As our Party strives to progress in the fight against discrimination of all kinds, these six basic elements have evolved and grown along with the constant push for more inclusion and empowerment. These provisions demonstrate the intention of the Democratic Party to ensure a full opportunity for all minority group members to participate in the delegate selection process. (Rule 4.A, Rule 4.B & Rule 4.C)
 - 1. All public meetings at all levels of the Democratic Party in State should be open to all members of the Democratic Party regardless of race, sex, age, color, creed, national origin, religion, ethnic identity, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, economic status or disability (hereinafter collectively referred to as "status"). (Rule 4.B.1)
 - 2. No test for membership in, nor any oaths of loyalty to, the Democratic Party in State should be required or used which has the effect of requiring prospective or current members of the Democratic Party to acquiesce in, condone or support discrimination based on "status." (Rule 4.B.2)
 - 3. The time and place for all public meetings of the Democratic Party in State on all levels should be publicized fully and, in such manner, as to assure timely notice to all interested persons. Such meetings must be held in places accessible to all Party members and large enough to accommodate all interested persons. (Rule 4.B.3)
 - 4. The Democratic Party in State, on all levels, should support the broadest possible registration without discrimination based on "status." (Rule 4.B.4)
 - 5. The Democratic Party in State should publicize fully and in such a manner as to assure notice to all interested parties a full description of the legal and practical procedures for selection of Democratic Party officers and representatives on all levels. Publication of these procedures should be done in such a fashion that all prospective and current members of the State Democratic Party will be fully and adequately informed of the pertinent procedures in time to participate in each selection procedure at all levels of the Democratic Party organization. As part of this, the State Democratic Party should develop a strategy to provide education programs directly to voters who continue to experience confusing timelines for registration, changing party affiliation deadlines, or lack of awareness of the process for running for delegate, to ensure all Democratic voters understand the rules and timelines and their impact on voter participation. (Rule 4.B.5)
 - 6. The Democratic Party in State should publicize fully and in such a manner as to assure notice to all interested parties, a complete description of the legal and practical qualifications of all positions as officers and representatives of the State Democratic Party. Such publication should be done in a timely fashion so that all prospective candidates or applicants for any elected or appointed position within each State Democratic Party will have full and adequate opportunity to compete for office. (Rule 4.B.6)

- B. Discrimination on the basis of "status" in the conduct of Democratic Party affairs is prohibited. (Rule 5.B)
- C. State's delegation shall be equally divided between delegate men and delegate women, and alternate men and alternate women, i.e. the number of men and women shall not vary by more than one. Such goal applies to the entire delegation, which includes all pledged delegates and alternates and all automatic delegates. Delegates and alternates shall be considered separate groups for purposes of achieving equal division as determined by gender self-identification. In the case of gender non-binary delegates or alternates, they shall not be counted as either a male or female, and the remainder of the delegation shall be equally divided by gender. (*Rule 6.C*)
- D. All delegate and alternate candidates must be identified as to presidential preference or uncommitted status at all levels which determine presidential preference. (Rule 13.A)
- E. No delegate at any level of the delegate selection process shall be mandated by law or Party rules to vote contrary to that person's presidential choice as expressed at the time the delegate is elected. (Rule 13.1)
- F. Delegates elected to the national convention pledged to a presidential candidate shall in all good conscience reflect the sentiments of those who elected them. (Rule 13.J)
- G. Each delegate, alternate and standing committee member must be a bona fide Democrat, who is faithful to the interests, welfare and success of the Democratic Party of the United States, who subscribes to the substance, intent and principles of the Charter and Bylaws of the Democratic Party of the United States, and who will participate in the Convention in good faith. (Rule 13.H, Call VII.A.4 & Reg. 4.26)
- H. A majority of the members of any Party body above the first level of the delegate selection process shall constitute a quorum for any business pertaining to the selection of National Convention delegates, alternates, standing committee members, and other official Convention participants. (Rule 16)
- I. South Dakota does not allow a proxy vote. Delegates attending the Statewide Caucus on March 21, 2020 or Delegates to the State Convention on June 19-20,2020 must be present in person to cast a vote. A county party may send alternates to the State Convention if duly filed by the deadline of June 5, 2020. (Rule 17 & Reg. 4.32)
- J. The unit rule, or any rule or practice whereby all members of a Party unit or delegation may be required to cast their votes in accordance with the will of a majority of the body, shall not be used at any stage of the delegate selection process. (Rule 18.A)
- K. Any individual or group of Democrats may sponsor or endorse a slate of candidates for convention delegates. But no slate may, by virtue of such endorsement, receive a preferential place on a delegate selection ballot or be publicly identified on the ballot as the official Democratic Party organization slate, and all slates must meet identical qualifying requirements for appearing on a ballot at all levels of the delegate selection process. (Rule 18.B)

- L. All steps in the delegate selection process, including the filing of presidential candidates, must take place within the calendar year of the Democratic National Convention, except with respect to the implementation of the Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Programs. (Rule 1.F & Rule 12.B)
- M. In electing and certifying delegates and alternates to the 2020 Democratic National Convention, the State Democratic Party hereby undertakes to assure all Democratic voters in South Dakota, a full, timely and equal opportunity to participate in the delegate selection process and in all Party affairs and to implement affirmative action and outreach and inclusion plans toward that end; that the delegates and alternates to the Convention shall be selected in accordance with the Delegate Selection Rules for the 2020 Democratic National Convention; and that the delegates certified will not publicly support or campaign for any candidate for President or Vice President other than the nominees of the Democratic National Convention. (Call II.B)

Section VIII

Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program

A. Statement of Purpose and Organization

- 1. Purpose and Objectives
 - a. To make sure that the Democratic Party at all levels be an open Party which includes rather than excludes people from participation, a program of effective affirmative action is hereby adopted by South Dakota. (Rule 5.A)
 - b. Discrimination on the basis of "status" in the conduct of Democratic Party affairs is prohibited. (*Rule 5.B*)
 - c. All public meetings at all levels of the Democratic Party in State should be open to all members of the Democratic Party regardless of race, sex, age, color, creed, national origin, religion, ethnic identity, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, economic status or disability (hereinafter collectively referred to as "status"). (Rule 4.B.1)
 - d. Consistent with the Democratic Party's commitment to including groups historically under-represented in the Democratic Party's affairs, by virtue of race, sex, age, color, creed, national origin, religion, ethnic identity, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, or disability, State has established goals for these groups. (Rule 5.C & Reg. 4.8)
 - e. To encourage full participation by all Democrats in the delegate selection process and in all Party affairs, the State Democratic Party has adopted and will implement programs with specific goals and timetables for African Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders and women. To further encourage full participation in the process, the State Party has established goals and timetables for other underrepresented groups, including the LGBTQ+ community, people with disabilities, and youth. (Rule 6.A & Rule 7)

- (1) The goal of the program shall be to encourage participation in the delegate selection process and in Party organizations at all levels by the aforementioned groups as indicated by their presence in the Democratic electorate. (Rule 6.A.1)
- (2) For the delegate selection process, "Youth" is defined as any participant younger than 36 years old at the time of election. (Reg. 5.3.A)
- (3) For the delegate selection process, individuals identifying as Native Americans should provide their tribal affiliation and indicate if they are enrolled in a tribe. (Reg. 5.3.B)
- (4) These goals shall not be accomplished either directly or indirectly by the Party's imposition of mandatory quotas at any level of the delegate selection process or in any other Party affairs. (Rule 6.A.2)

2. Organizational Structure

- a. An Affirmative Action Committee shall be appointed by the State Democratic Chair on March 1, 2019. (Rule 6.F)
- b. The State Democratic Chair shall certify in writing to the Rules and Bylaws Committee of the Democratic National Committee the compliance of the State's Affirmative Action Committee with Rules 5.C, 6.A and 7, and submit the names, demographic data and contact information of the members no later than 15 days after their appointment. (Reg. 2.2.J)
- c. The Committee shall consist of members who are regionally diverse and represent the Democratic constituency groups set forth in the Introduction to the Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program. (See Attachment 1 at the end of this document).
- d. The Affirmative Action Committee shall be responsible for:
 - (1) Helping develop and design the proposed Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program and making recommendations to the State Democratic Chair. (Rule 6.F)
 - (2) Directing the implementation of all requirements of the Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program section of this Plan.
 - (3) Implementing a specific outreach and financial assistance program for persons of low and moderate income to encourage their participation and representation in the national convention delegation. (Rule 6.G)
 - (4) Ensuring, on behalf of the State Party Committee, that district lines used in the delegate selection process are not gerrymandered to discriminate against African Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders and women. (Rule 6.E)

- e. Financial and staff support for the Affirmative Action Committee shall be provided by the State Party Committee to the greatest extent feasible, including, but not limited to, making available on a priority basis, the State Party staff and volunteers, and covering all reasonable costs incurred in carrying out this Plan.
- 3. Implementation of the Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program shall begin on June 3, 2019 with the distribution of the press kits, and will continue through the end of the delegate selection process. (Rule 1.F)

B. Representation Goals

- 1. In cooperation with the National Committee, the State Party has determined the demographic composition of African Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans, and Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in the state's Democratic electorate. These constituency percentages shall be established as goals for representation in the state's convention delegation. (Rule 6.A)
- 2. In cooperation with the National Committee, the State Party has determined the demographic composition of members of the LGBTQ+ community, people with disabilities, and youth in the state's Democratic electorate. The State Party has chosen to establish these percentages as goals for representation in the state's convention delegation. (Rule 7 & Reg. 4.8.C.iii)

- 3. When selecting the at-large portion of the delegation, the demographic composition of the other delegates (district-level, pledged PLEO, and Automatic) shall be compared with the State Party's representation goals to achieve an at-large selection process that helps to bring about a representative balance. (Rule 11.A)
- 4. Although the selection of the at-large delegation may be used to fulfill affirmative action goals established by this Plan, the State Party will conduct outreach and inclusion activities such as recruitment, education and training at all levels of the delegate selection process. (Rule 6.A.3)

C. Efforts to Educate on the Delegate Selection Process

1. Well-publicized educational workshops will be conducted in each of the seven regional divisions beginning in September 2019. These workshops will be designed to encourage participation in the delegate selection process, including apprising potential delegate and alternate candidates of the availability of financial assistance. These workshops will be held in places that are easily

accessible to persons with disabilities. The times, dates, places and rules for the conduct of all education workshops, meetings and other events involved in the delegate selection process shall be effectively publicized by the party organization and include mailings to various organizations representative of the Democratic voting electorate. (Rule 3.A, Rule 3.C & Rule 3.D)

- 2. A speakers bureau of volunteers from the State Party, including the Affirmative Action Committee, shall be comprised of individuals who are fully familiar with the process, will be organized to appear before groups, as needed, to provide information concerning the process.
- 3. The State Party's education efforts will include outreach to community leaders within the Democratic Party's constituencies and making sure that information about the delegate selection process is available to Democratic clubs (like South Dakota College Democrats, High School Democrats, YELL Young Elected Legislative Leaders) County Democratic Parties, and Party caucuses representing specific constituencies. Constituency Caucuses are scheduled in two locations in 2019: June 7-8, 2019 in Sioux Falls and June 14-15, 2019 in Rapid City (specific locations TBD).
- 4. The State Party will publish and make available at no cost: a clear and concise explanation of how Democratic voters can participate in the delegate selection process. As well, the State Party shall also make available copies of the State Party Rules, the Delegate Selection Plan (and its attachments), the Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program, and relevant state statutes at no cost. Copies of documents related to the state's delegate selection process will be prepared and the State Party and Affirmative Action Committee will distribute them in the various delegate districts not later than June 3, 2019. (Rule 1.H)
- 5. Participation in the delegate selection process shall be open to all voters who wish to participate as Democrats. Democratic voters shall be those persons who publicly declare their Party preference and have that preference publicly recorded. (Rule 2.A)
- 6. The State Party shall take all feasible steps to encourage non-affiliated voters and new voters to register or enroll, to provide simple procedures through which they may do so and to eliminate excessively long waiting periods for voters wish to register or to change their party enrollment status. (Rule 2.C)
- 7. The Affirmative Action Committee will develop a State Party strategy to be implemented beginning June 3, 2019 that will provide education programs directly to voters who continue to experience confusing timelines for registration, changing party affiliation deadlines, or lack of awareness of the process for running for delegate, to ensure all Democratic voters understand the rules and timelines and their impact on voter participation. (*Rule 4.B.5*)

D. Efforts to Publicize the Delegate Selection Process

1. The State Party shall direct special attention to publicizing the delegate selection process in the state. Such publicity shall include information on eligibility to vote and how to become a candidate for delegate, the time and location of each stage of the delegate selection process, and where to get additional information. The foregoing information will also be published in the State Party communications and on the State Party's website. The Party organization, official,

candidate, or member calling a meeting or scheduling an event, shall effectively publicize the role that such meeting or event plays in the selection of delegates and alternates to the Democratic National Convention. (Rule 3.C & Rule 3.D)

- 2. The State Party shall have a Delegate Selection Media Plan (see Attachment 2) for using all available and appropriate resources, such as social media, websites, newspapers, radio and television, to inform the general public how, when and where to participate in the delegate selection process. Specifically, the Delegate Selection Media Plan will provide details as to how to qualify to run as a delegate candidate. Regular updates should be posted/released throughout the state's delegate selection process to ensure broad and timely coverage and awareness about the process to all interested persons. (Rule 4.B.3 & Rule 6.D)
- 3. A priority effort, as described in the Delegate Selection Media Plan, shall be directed at publicity among the Democratic Party's constituencies.
 - a. Information about the delegate selection process will be posted on and made available to social and specialty media directed toward the Democratic constituency groups set forth in the introduction of this Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program.
 - b. The State Party shall be responsible for the implementation of this publicity effort. For purposes of providing adequate notice of the delegate selection process, the times, dates, places and rules for the conduct of informational meetings, caucuses, and State Party meetings involved in the delegate selection process shall be effectively publicized, multilingually where necessary, to encourage the participation of minority groups. (Rule 6.D) (see Attachment 2 for specific dates and locations).
- 4. The State Party will post the initial draft of the South Dakota Delegate Selection Plan on its website on March 20, 2019 and invite public comment. Upon approval of the South Dakota Delegate Selection Plan by the DNC's Rules and Bylaws Committee, the State Party will make the finalized version of the Delegate Selection Plan and other information about the delegate selection process available on its website and publicize the resource through press releases and communications to Party leaders, activists and targeted constituencies. Information to be posted on the website will include:
 - a. materials designed to encourage participation and inform prospective delegate candidates;
 - b. a summary explaining the role of the 2020 Convention in nominating the Party's Presidential and Vice Presidential candidates and adopting the National Platform;
 - c. a summary of the State Party's delegate selection process including all pertinent rules, dates, and filing requirements related to the process;
 - d. a map of the seven regions (each comprised of 5 legislative districts) how many delegates will be elected within each region, along with filing forms or information on how to obtain the filing forms. (Attachment 3).

E. Obligations of Presidential Candidates to Maximize Participation

- 1. Presidential candidates shall assist the State Democratic Party in meeting the demographic representation goals reflected in the Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program. (Rule 6.H)
- 2. Each presidential candidate must submit a written statement to the State Democratic Chair by March 12, 2020 which indicates the specific steps they will take to encourage full participation by their supporters in State's delegate selection process, including, but not limited to, procedures by which persons may file as candidates for delegate or alternate pledged to the presidential candidate. (Rule 6.H.1)
- 3. Each presidential candidate must submit demographic information with respect to all candidates for delegate and alternate pledged to them. Such information shall be submitted in conjunction with the list of names approved for consideration as delegate and alternate candidates pledged to the presidential candidate. (Rule 6.H.2)
- 4. Presidential candidates shall use their best effort to ensure that their respective delegates, alternates and standing committee members shall achieve the affirmative action goals reflected in the Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program and that the number of men and the number of women in their respective delegations shall not differ by more than one (as determined by gender self-identification). Furthermore, presidential candidates shall use their best efforts at the district level to approve delegate, alternate, and standing committee candidates who meet applicable equal division and affirmative action considerations to promote and achieve the state's affirmative action, outreach and inclusion goals and equal division for their respective delegations. (Rule 6.C., Rule 6.I. & Reg. 4.10)

F. Outreach and Inclusion Program

- 1. The State Democratic Party is committed to help achieve full participation of those groups of Americans who have historically been explicitly denied the right to vote or who have been subjected to discriminatory and exclusionary practices that have denied them voting rights and full participation in the delegate selection process and other Party meetings, events and elections, along with other groups of Americans who are also underrepresented in Party affairs.
- 2. As such, the State Democratic Party has developed outreach and inclusion programs and is committed to fully implementing the programs so that all persons who wish to participate as Democrats understand they are welcome and encouraged to be a part of the delegate selection process and in the Party at the local, state and national levels.
- 3. The State Party will make accommodations to facilitate greater participation by people with disabilities.
- 4. In addition to the education, publicity, and other steps described above, the State Party will follow the Affirmative Action Plan (Attachment 1) and Delegate Selection Media Plan (Attachment 2). Both documents describe in detail further efforts to include underrepresented communities in the delegate selection process.

Section IX Challenges

A. Jurisdiction & Standing

- Challenges related to the delegate selection process are governed by the Regulations of the DNC Rules and Bylaws Committee for the 2020 Democratic National Convention (Reg. Sec. 3), and the "Rules of Procedure of the Credentials Committee of the 2020 Democratic National Convention." (Call Appendix A)
- 2. Under Rule 21.B. of the 2020 Delegate Selection Rules, the DNC Rules and Bylaws Committee has jurisdiction over challenges pertaining to the submission, non-implementation and violation of state Delegate Selection and Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program. (Rule 21.B & Call Appendix A)
- 3. The Rules and Bylaws Committee has jurisdiction to hear and decide any challenge provided it is initiated <u>before</u> the 56th day preceding the date of the commencement of the 2020 Democratic National Convention. (*Call Appendix A & Reg. 3.1*)
- 4. Challenges to the credentials of delegates and alternates to the 2020 Democratic National Convention initiated <u>on or after</u> the 56th day preceding the date of commencement of the Democratic National Convention shall be processed in accordance with the "Rules of Procedure of the Credentials Committee of the 2020 Democratic National Convention." (Call Appendix A)
- 5. Any challenge to the credentials of a standing committee member shall be considered and resolved by the affected standing committee in accordance with Appendix A of the *Call for the 2020 Democratic National Convention*. The Rules and Bylaws Committee shall have jurisdiction over challenges brought before the 56th day preceding the date of the commencement of the Democratic National Convention. (*Call VII.B.5*)
- 6. Copies of the Regulations of the Rules and Bylaws Committee and/or the Call for the 2020 Democratic National Convention, including the Rules of Procedure of the Credentials Committee (Appendix A), shall be made available by the State Party upon reasonable request.
- 7. Any group of 15 Democrats with standing to challenge as defined in Reg. 3.2 or the Call (Appendix A, Sec. 2.A), may bring a challenge to this Plan or to the implementation of this Plan, including its Affirmative Action provisions.

B. Challenges to the Status of the State Party and Challenges to the Plan

1. A challenge to the status of the State Party Committee as the body entitled to sponsor a delegation from that state shall be filed with the Rules and Bylaws Committee not later than 30 calendar days prior to the initiation of the state's delegate selection process. (Rule 21.A & Reg. 3.4.A)

- 2. A challenge to the state's Delegate Selection Plan shall be filed with the Chair of the State Democratic Party and the Co-Chairs of the Rules and Bylaws Committee within 15 calendar days after the adoption of the Plan by the State Party. (Reg. 3.4.B)
- 3. A challenge to a Plan must be brought in conformity with the Rules and the RBC Regulations, which should be consulted for a detailed explanation of challenge procedures.

C. Challenges to Implementation

- 1. A challenge may be brought alleging that a specific requirement of an approved Plan has not been properly implemented. Jurisdiction over all challenges initiated in a timely fashion shall reside with either the Rules and Bylaws Committee or the Credentials Committee of the National Convention (See Section VII.A. above). However, the Rules and Bylaws Committee may provide advice, assistance or interpretations of the Delegate Selection Rules at any stage of the delegate selection process. (Reg. 3.1.C)
- 2. An implementation challenge brought before the Rules and Bylaws Committee is initiated by filing a written challenge with the State Party Committee and with the Rules and Bylaws Committee not later than 15 days after the alleged violation occurred. The State Party has 21 days to render a decision. Within 10 days of the decision, any party to the challenge may appeal it to the Rules and Bylaws Committee. If in fact, the State Party renders no decision, any party to the challenge may request the Rules and Bylaws Committee to process it. The request must be made within 10 days after expiration of the above 21-day period. (Reg. 3.4.C, Reg. 3.4.E & Reg. 3.4.H)
- 3. Performance under an approved Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Program and composition of the convention delegation shall be considered relevant evidence in the challenge to any state delegation. If a State Party has adopted and implemented an approved affirmative action program, the State Party shall not be subject to challenge based solely on delegation composition or primary results. (Rule 6.B) The procedures are the same for challenges alleging failure to properly implement the Affirmative Action Plan and Outreach and Inclusion Programs of a Plan, except that such challenges must be filed no later than 30 days prior to the initiation of the state's delegate selection process. (Reg. 3.4.C)
- 4. Depending on the appropriate jurisdiction (see Section VIII.A. above), implementation challenges must be brought in conformity with the Regulations of the Rules and Bylaws Committee or the Rules of Procedure of the Credentials Committee, which should be consulted for a detailed explanation of challenge procedures.

Section X Summary of Plan

A. Selection of Delegates and Alternates

South Dakota will use a proportional representation system based on the results of the June 2, 2020 primary apportioning its delegates to the 2020 Democratic National Convention.

Delegates and alternates will be selected as summarized on the following chart:



Attachment 5: Step by Step Advice for SD Democrats Seeking to be a Delegate in Milwaukee, WI, July 13-16, 2020

- 1. **Volunteer** (starting NOW) to support your choice for the next Democratic President of the US and to help elect Democrats up and down the ballot!
- 2. **Sign a pledge** of support for your preferred candidate or your uncommitted preference between Feb. 10 and Mar. 9 of 2020, Form available with contact to SDDP and mailed to: SDDP, PO Box 1485, Sioux Falls, SD 57105.
- 3. **Invite** your Democratic friends and supporters, who are eligible voters in your Legislative District to the Regional Caucus on Sat. March 14,2020 at a time and place TBD. Each of the seven Regional Caucuses will be held on March 14, 2020. Elected delegates from your Region <u>for each presidential candidate</u> (or uncommitted) must attend the State Caucus March 21, 2020 in Pierre.
- 4. **Submit a form** to SDDP indicating intent to run as a delegate at the statewide Caucus in Pierre no later than March 16, 2020 at 5 pm. (Forms available at the Regional Caucuses on Sat. Mar. 14).
- 5. **Communicate and campaign** with other elected delegates supporting your presidential preference from the other Regional Caucuses. Names/contact information will be available from SDDP by March 17 at 5 pm.
- 6. **Run as a delegate** at the Statewide Caucus in Pierre on March 21, 2020. The more votes you gather among your presidential preference statewide caucus, the more likely you are to represent him or her in Milwaukee. 9 delegates and two alternates will be filed with the Secretary of State <u>for each</u> Democratic Presidential candidate on the June 2, 2020 primary ballot.
- 7. **Campaign for your Presidential Candidate!** If you are a Democratic County Party officer or a State Officer, remember to campaign as an individual. (You do not represent your County or the SDDP). South Dakota has a "binding primary" so the percentage your candidate receives of the primary vote, is the percentage of delegates that candidate sends to Milwaukee. (A candidate must receive 15% of the primary vote to seek any delegates).
- 8. **If at first you don't succeed, try again!** If you are not elected as a delegate on June 2, you may run again at the State Convention in Sioux Falls on June 19-20, 2020 as one of the 3 At-large Delegates who will be elected by the Convention Delegates. Again, you will need to campaign among Convention Delegates members and earn the right to represent South Dakota at the national convention.
- 9. **Save your money and pack your bags** for Milwaukee, WI for the July 13-16, 2020 National Convention. The South Dakota Democratic Party does not financially sponsor delegates. In the past, some delegates have fund-raised with their county party or like-minded supporters of your Presidential Candidate.

How are delegates elected? Delegates elected in each Regional Caucus on Saturday, March 14, 2020 and <u>must attend</u> the Statewide Caucus on Saturday, March 21, 2020 in Pierre. 9 delegates will be elected on March 21 <u>for each</u> Presidential Candidate. SD has a "binding primary" meaning that the primary vote on June 2, 2020 will determine the percentage of delegates seated for the national convention. Any presidential candidate falling below 15% shall not be awarded delegates.

How many may attend the statewide caucus from each? This is determined for each of the seven Regional Caucuses by the number of votes per Region for the 2016 Democratic Presidential candidate <u>and</u> the votes for the 2018 SD Democratic Gubernatorial candidate. This allocation follows on the next page.
